The flesh of the mangosteen is white. The mangosteen has white flesh.

[plùak maŋ-khút mii sǐi mûaŋ]
The rind of the mangosteen is purple.

[núa tεεŋ-moo mii sǐi dεεŋ]
The flesh of the watermelon is red.

[plùak tεεŋ-moo mii sǐi khǐaw]
The rind of the watermelon is green.

[sôm kàp tɛɛŋ-moo mii má?-lét]
Oranges and watermelons have seeds.

[sàp-pà?-rót mâj-mii má?-lét]
Pineapples have no seeds.

I like to eat durian.
